T-TOWN WHEELERS OCTOBER 8TH SHOW



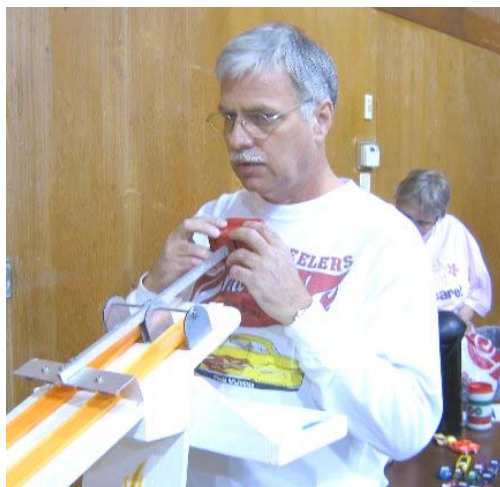

For the second race many racers chose to change their strategy and opted to enter a Faster Than Ever Series car.

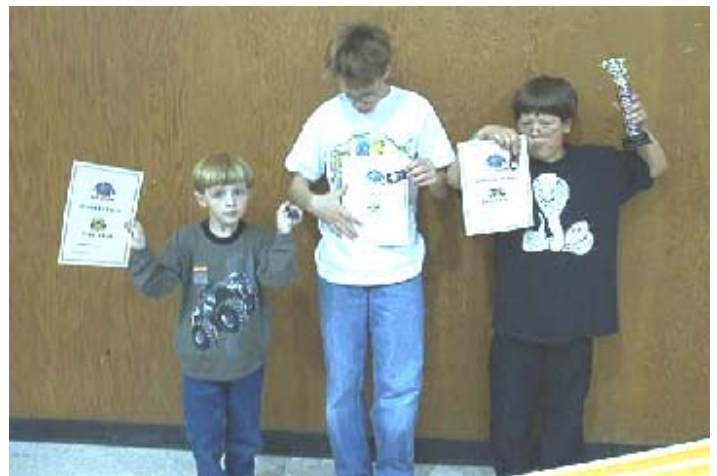

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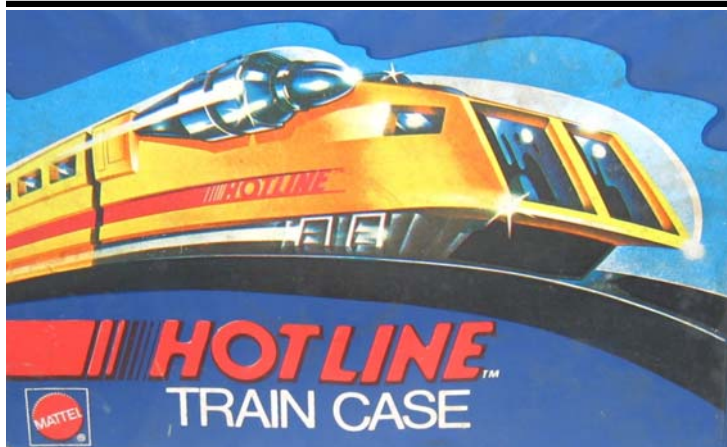
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By this time you are most likely asking the question "Hey Robert are you stuck in the 70's"??? Well I may be, but it was an interesting time in the world of Hot Wheels.

These were futuristic trains powered by the same rechargeable battery as the Sizzlers cars and shared the same chargers. They were very fast and ran on regular Hot Wheels track, but all sets were offered with black track that had two silver stripes on them.

The train engine was called the Speed Chief, it was always gold in color with a red stripe on the sides with the "Hot Line" logo at the front of the engine. There was a futuristic caboose the Tail Wagon that was also gold in color with the

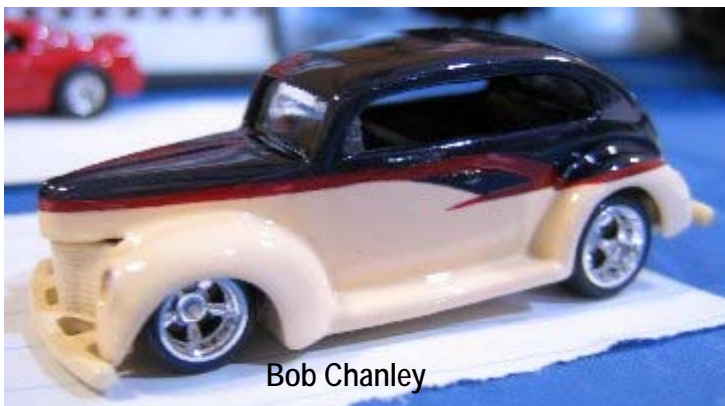

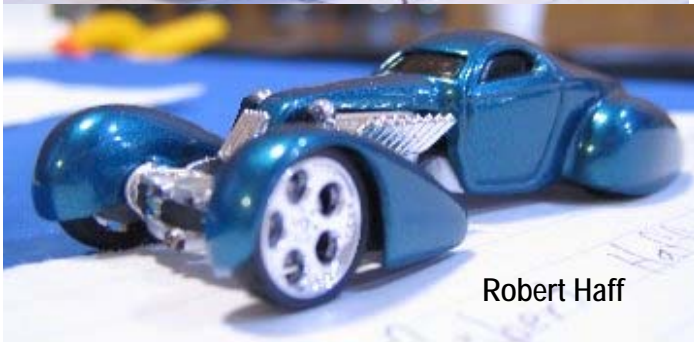

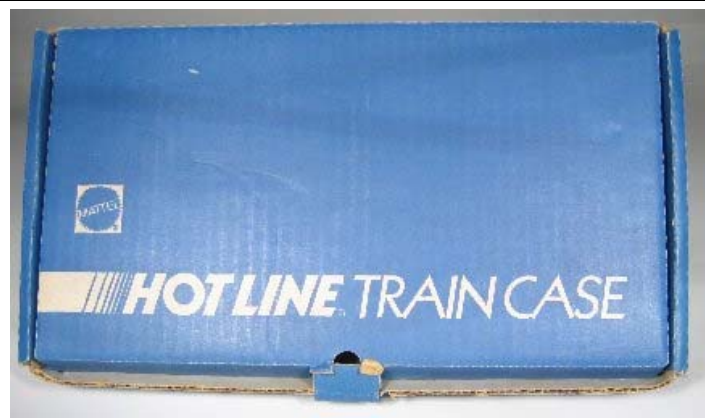
ABOVE: ROCKIN' ROLLER HOPPER CAR
